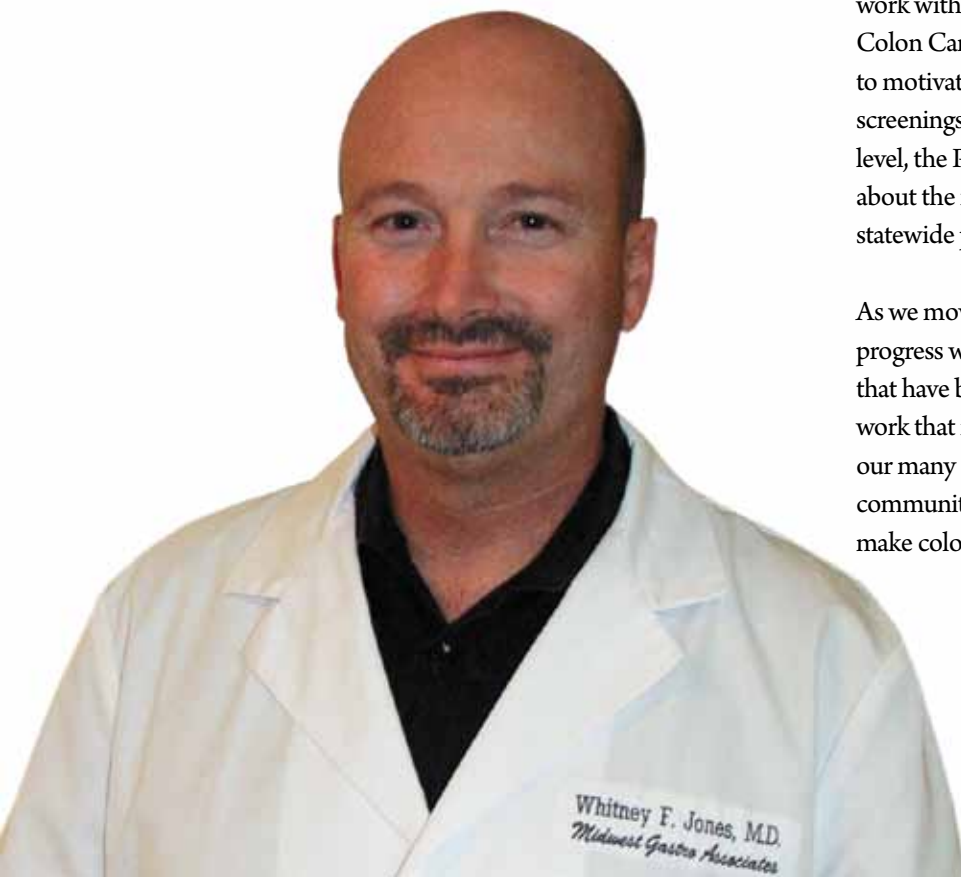

Through our leadership at the state level, the Project continues to be integral to increasing the dialogue about the impact of colon cancer in our state and the development of statewide programs.

As we move forward into 2010, we are extremely grateful for the progress we have made, the support we have received, and the lives that have been changed. At the same time, we remain aware of the work that remains. I am confident that that with the support of our many dedicated volunteers, donors, local health professionals, community partners, and friends, we can maintain momentum and make colon cancer a disease of the past.

A LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Few cancer deaths are as easily preventable as those resulting from colon cancer. Still, many at-risk people fail to be screened because they are unaware of the life-saving benefits, uncomfortable with the idea of the procedure, or lack the resources. For these reasons, colon cancer remains the 2nd leading cause of cancer death in the U.S. and Kentucky.

The Colon Cancer Prevention Project was founded in 2004 to address these obstacles and prevent unnecessary death and suffering. The Project is an independent 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to improving the quality of life in Kentucky and surrounding communities. Our mission is to eliminate preventable colon cancer by increasing screening rates through education, advocacy, and health systems improvement in Kentucky and surrounding communities.

Today, the Project provides focus, leadership, and support for the growing movement to spread awareness about colon cancer prevention.

Due to the Project's hard work and that of our many committed partners, significant progress has been made. In 1997, Kentucky's colorectal cancer screening rate was 2nd worst in the nation, according to the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System. In 2006, Kentucky's screening rate surpassed the national average, and by 2008, Kentucky had moved up to 23rd in the state rankings. Over time, continued improvement in screening rates will reduce the number of individuals diagnosed with late stage colon cancer and the number of individuals who lose their lives to this disease.

The Project's continued success has been made possible because of the generosity and passion of each and every one of our donors, partners, advocates, volunteers, and frontline fighters – the individuals and families directly affected by this disease.

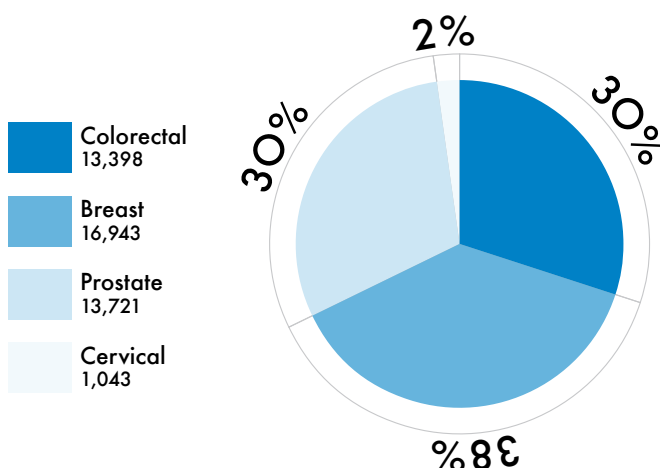
We know that you share our vision, as do the 150,000 Americans who will be diagnosed in 2010, and the 50,000 who will not survive the next year.

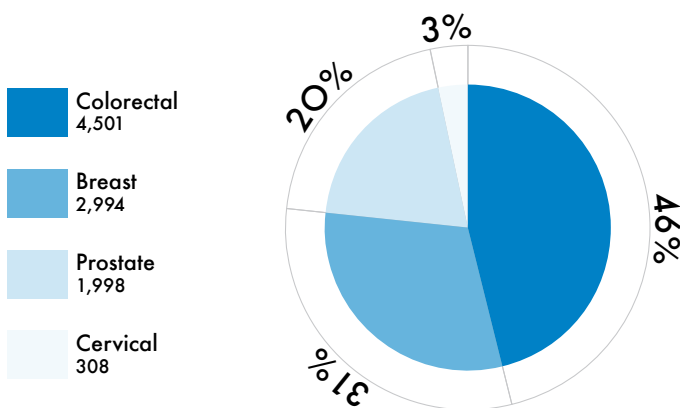

2009 Walk Away from Colon Cancer

The Project's largest fundraiser, the Fourth Annual Walk Away From Colon Cancer, was held on August 29, 2009 at EP Tom Sawyer State Park in Louisville. The event raised more than \$60,000 to promote colon cancer awareness, early detection, and prevention of colorectal cancer through increased screening rates. Honorary Walk Chair and WHAS11 news anchor Rachel Platt kicked off the festivities. More than 500 people—survivors, patients, family, friends and concerned members of the community—attended and contributed to the cause!

In addition to support from individuals in the community, the event was sponsored and supported by a group of volunteers, local hospital systems, physician practices, area businesses, and other partners.

The Project commends the entire Walk Committee and its co-chairs, Chris Thompson and Lisa Jackson, whose organization, leadership, and hard work made the event possible.

The 2010 event will be held at on Saturday, August 28 at Iroquois Park in Louisville and will include a 5K race!



Catching A Killer

On June 16, 2009, the Project's fourth annual television special, *Catching A Killer: Preventing Colon Cancer In Kentucky*, aired on Kentucky Educational Television (KET) across the state and in neighboring communities. Host Renee Shaw welcomed Dr. Whitney Jones, founder of the Colon Cancer Prevention Project; Torrie Harris, DrPH, director of the Kentucky Office of Health Equity; and Dr. Jon Hourigan, a colon and rectal surgeon and professor at the University of Kentucky College of Medicine. This live panel of experts discussed colon cancer in Kentucky and took questions from viewers while a bank of volunteer endoscopy nurses took well over 100 calls from across the state. The program also delivered powerful messages from physicians, patients, and survivors.

KET reaches more than 4 million homes in 10 television markets in Kentucky and seven bordering states, including the Nashville, Cincinnati, Louisville, Charleston/Huntington, and Lexington metro areas. Around 25,000 viewers watched the initial program, which was re-broadcast at least three additional times.

Catching a Killer was made possible through numerous partnerships with health and community groups throughout Kentucky, including Jewish Hospital & St. Mary's HealthCare, Norton Healthcare, and the Louisville Department of Public Health & Wellness. Many thanks are due to the hard working staff at KET and to Laura Crawford and Archie Borders for their production work. The Project is currently working to develop a 2010 show, featuring new and updated content.

Patient Support

While working with patients and families battling colon cancer, the Project discovered that despite the prevalence of this disease, there was no support group tailored to patients and survivors in the Louisville metropolitan area. Recognizing emotional and social support communities are an essential complement to medical treatment for patients and to the family members and others who are affected by the disease, the Project partnered with Gilda's Club Louisville to create this network of support.

The first meeting was held in August 2009, and regular meetings are now held the 4th Wednesday of each month for individuals across the area who are battling or touched by colon cancer. The group provides a forum for individuals to share their experiences and support one another. Since its inception, the group has grown tremendously, a true testament to the need in this area. The Project is working to expand this group to neighboring communities.



"As with a lot of things in life, one becomes more knowledgeable having gone through and actually experiencing any given situation. Unfortunately for me, I was educated very thoroughly and quite dramatically after I experienced my own situation of a diagnosis of colon cancer at age 53. Of course had I known when I was age 50 what I know now, I would be the first in line to be screened. Not only for the good of my own personal health but for the love of my wife and children as to what they have endured as well.

I felt like I was ruined but as the months went by my recovery exceeded my expectations and I discovered a survival mode, a sort of silver lining that fueled my passion for cycling along with my own desire and will to make myself better. I did things I would not have otherwise and made new experiences and friendships along the way. I must have caused a stir within others near me as friends and acquaintances got their screenings for the betterment of their own health. That is what pleases me the most and is the true silver lining."

Advocacy

The Project's ongoing advocacy and grassroots initiatives have led to the enactment of two state laws—one requiring insurers to cover colon cancer screening procedures for those at risk according to American Cancer Society guidelines and the other implementing a statewide program to educate all Kentuckians about the importance of screening and early detection and to provide screening procedures to uninsured Kentuckians through the Kentucky Colon Cancer Screening Program.

In 2009, the Project served as an active member and leader in the state-mandated Kentucky Colon Cancer Screening Program Advisory Committee and supporting groups. Project founder Dr. Whitney Jones is Chair of the Advisory Committee. By statute, this committee reports to the Governor and is tasked with implementing the statewide awareness campaign and screening program. With the program framework in place, funding is all that remains to make the Kentucky Colon Cancer Screening Program fully operational.

The Project has also contributed to the statewide Colon Cancer Prevention Committee, chaired by Project Board Member Bill Beam. This group was formed through collaboration between the Project, the Kentucky Cancer Consortium, and the Prevent Cancer Foundation to host an interactive summit called Dialogue For Action. Participants crafted a set of recommendations and initiatives designed to increase colorectal cancer screening and decrease mortality. The Colon Cancer Prevention Committee works continuously to implement and update these strategies.

Over the past year, the Project has worked diligently to advocate for state funding to make this life-saving program reality. Early in 2010, legislation was filed allocating this funding and, despite the tough economic climate and state budgetary shortfalls, the bill passed the Kentucky House of Representatives and the Senate Health & Welfare Committee.

The Project collaborates with many coalitions, organizations, and agencies to bring the patient's voice to the forefront of cancer-prevention discussions. These partners include the American Cancer Society, the Kentucky Cancer Consortium, the Kentucky Cancer Program, the Patient Advocate Foundation, and many more.

SPOTLIGHT: EDUCATION & AWARENESS

Educational Materials

A critical mission of the Colon Cancer Prevention Project has been placing educational materials in the hands of healthcare professionals, healthcare facilities, employers, and individuals throughout Kentucky and beyond. Only when people are educated as to their risk factors and the benefits of colon cancer screening can they make informed decisions about their health.

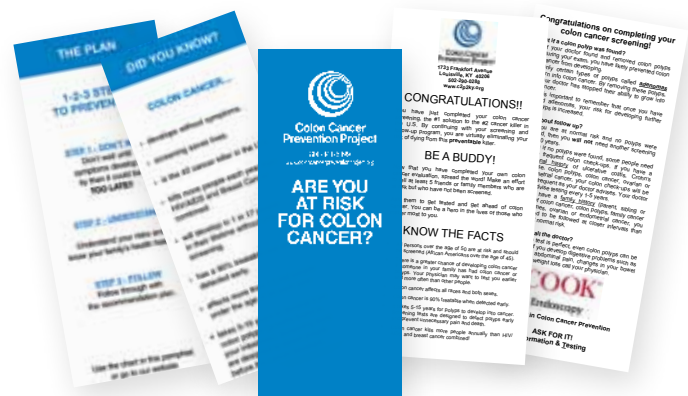
Well over 500,000 educational pamphlets have been distributed throughout the region. These include the popular “Are You At Risk for Colon Cancer?” pamphlets, as well as the “Buddy” pamphlets, which encourage those who have been screened to spread the message to their loved ones to be screened as well. Blue awareness wristbands are also distributed as a reminder to get screened and encourage others to do the same.

With the help of dedicated volunteers, the Project participates in health fairs and other events to spread awareness about this common, but little discussed disease.

The Project Medical Advisory Committee developed the Colorectal Cancer Screening Tip Sheet as a tool for healthcare providers to encourage proper screening and surveillance recommendations. The Tip Sheet is designed to assist healthcare providers in making proper recommendations in order to increase prevention and early detection. More than 2,500 copies have been distributed across the state.

Super Colon™

During an evening Louisville Bats baseball game at Louisville’s Slugger Field on August 15, 2009, baseball fans were greeted by an unexpected site: The Prevent Cancer Foundation’s Super Colon™. The Super Colon™, an 8-foot tall, 20-foot long inflatable model of a colon, is designed to teach people about the risks, symptoms, prevention measures, and early detection and treatment options for colon cancer. While certainly unexpected, the Super Colon serves as a tremendous awareness raising tool, and drew the attention of a large crowd and generated media coverage that reached across the Kentuckiana news area. Due to the popularity of this event, several Project partners will be creating similar exhibits across the region in the coming year to educate people and promote additional awareness for colon cancer prevention.

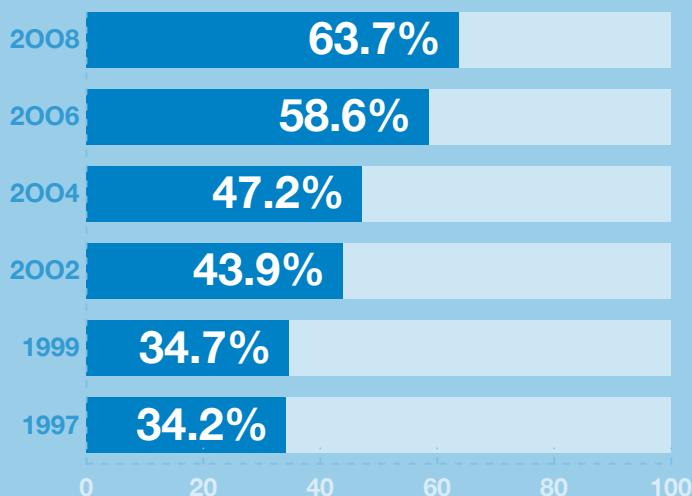

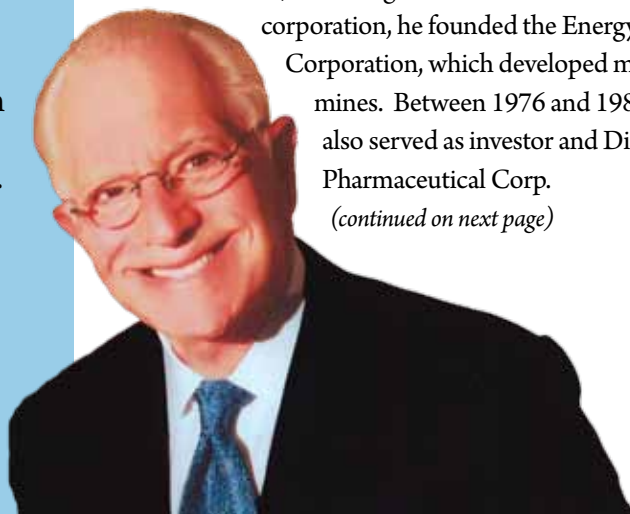
Donor: Phillip M. Greenberg

Since the Project's inception, Mr. Phillip Greenberg has been a steadfast supporter of its many initiatives and has joined us in working to reduce colon cancer death and suffering. His generosity has substantially increased our ability to move toward achieving our mission.

Mr. Greenberg graduated with honors from Penn State University and received his Masters in Business Administration from the University of Pittsburgh. Mr. Greenberg attended the Naval Officer Candidate School at Newport, Rhode Island. After being commissioned an Ensign, he attended a six month naval training program at the University of Georgia and served more than three years in active duty as a Lieutenant Junior Grade on the U.S.S. Bon Home Richard (CVA 31), primarily in the Pacific. Mr. Greenberg later lived in New York, where he learned about the mining and marketing of coal. He returned to his home town of New Castle, Pennsylvania and founded Oakleaf Coal Co., with mines in

Gilbert, West Virginia. After Oakleaf was sold to a public corporation, he founded the Energy Development Corporation, which developed metallurgical coal mines. Between 1976 and 1986 Mr. Greenberg also served as investor and Director of Key Pharmaceutical Corp.

In addition to being an astute businessman, Mr. Greenberg is a lover of horses. In 1970 he moved his Saddlebred horses to Simpsonville, Kentucky where he later purchased a horse farm and built a state of the art stable and arena. During this time, he had seven, three year old, three gaited World Grand Champions, under the direction of trainers Don Harris and, many years later, John Conaster.

As a lifetime Penn State football fan and friend of Joe Paterno, Mr. Greenberg built the Indoor Sports Complex on campus that bears his name in 1982.

Throughout the years, Mr. Greenberg has served on the Boards of the YMCA (PA), Penn State University Mt. Nittany Society, Mount Sinai Medical Center (Miami, FL), Fund for the Arts, Kentucky Opera, and Jewish Hospital.

Of all of his accomplishments, he is most happy to be surrounded by his family, his three sons David, Jeffrey, Peter, and his daughter Gina. He also oversees the care of his 94 year-old mother, worries about all seven of his grandchildren, is concerned for his country, and loves his wife Susie – his best friend and supporter.

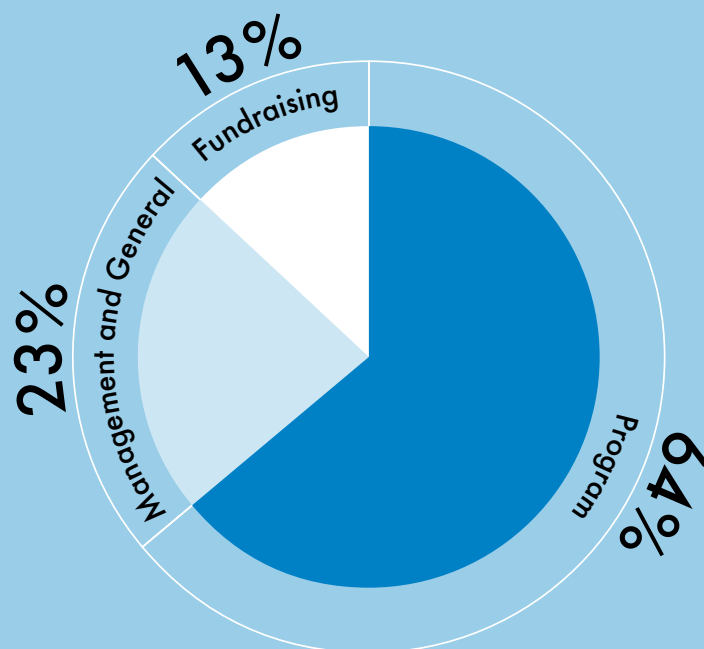
